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- MSUB senior, Alex Shin, organized of the "Exploring Space" event on campus. The two night event featured an opportunity each night to use the university's telescopes to view interesting celestial objects. As part of the program each night, Chancellor Nook presented short discussions on locating constellations and some of the stories associated with those constellations from various cultures. Mr. Shin is a participant in the Robert Noyce Teacher Scholarship Program. The scholarship, authorized by the National Science Foundation, encourages the development of STEM students and professionals to pursue teaching careers in elementary and secondary schools. Mr. Shin is a senior math major who wants to become a math instructor after graduation.
- The SkillsUSA Club at MSUB City College offered a free vehicle winterization inspection to the community. Katherine
  Pfau, Automotive Technology Instructor, said although the clinic was free, donations were accepted to help defer the
