### UMW Professor Publishes Research on Glacier Retreat in the Pioneer Mountains

Dr. Spruce W. Schoenemann from the University of Montana Western's Environmental Sciences Department recently published his work in the journal of Quaternary Science Reviews on glacier retreat in the Pioneer Mountains. The research paper titled "A cosmogenic <sup>10</sup>Be (Beryllium 10) moraine chronology of arid, alpine Late Pleistocene glaciation in the Pioneer Mountains of Montana, USA" is a peer-reviewed publication authored by Schoenemann and others that explores when glaciers in the Pioneer Mountains reached their maximum size during the Late Pleistocene period and why they retreated. The project involved extensive research methods that were conducted by UMW students guided by Dr. Schoenemann.

"This project really was the epitome of authentic practice in the discipline of glacial geology for our students. Their work has contributed new knowledge and insight to the paleoglacier science community in the western U.S.," said Schoenemann.

### UMW Faculty Members Receive National Recognition

# Montana Western Ranked Among Best Colleges by U.S. News and World Report

The University of Montana Western has been ranked #7 in Top Public Schools, #8 in Best Value Schools, #23 in Best Regional Colleges, and #46 in Top Performers on Social Mobility in the Western region by U.S. News & World Report in their 2023-24 rankings.

The rankings evaluate more than 1500 colleges and universities on up to 19 measures of academic quality. U.S. News calculates each ranking based on a specific methodology, using factors including overall graduation rates, academic quality, Pell grant graduation rates and social mobility, first generation graduation rates, student support services, financial support, and academic resources for faculty.

# TRIO Accelerator Program Welcomes New Students to Montana Western

TRIO Student Support Services welcomed 30 incoming first-year students to campus for the annual Accelerator Program to kick off the start of the fall semester.

TRIO programs are federal outreach and student services programs designed to identify and provide services for eligible students. Students qualify for the TRIO program if they are first-generation college students, have a disability, or fall below a certain income level. TRIO helps students overcome economic, social, and academic boundaries to higher education by assisting with basic college requirements and providing students with needed support.

The fifth annual Accelerator Program allowed new TRIO students to move in two days earlier than most freshmen, giving these students the chance to learn about the expectations of the TRIO program, meet their TRIO advisors and mentors, and locate their classrooms.
