• UMW Foundation Establishes Ronald J. Woods Charitable Trust Annual Scholarship

The University of Montana Western Foundation is proud to announce the Ronald J. Woods Charitable Trust Annual Scholarship, designed to support students pursuing degrees in education at Montana Western. This scholarship honors the legacy of Ronald J. Woods, a Notre Dame graduate and pioneer in injection molding technology, who later dedicated his life to philanthropy.

After retiring, Mr. Woods founded a nonprofit high school in Montana to assist students needing extra support. Though the school has since closed, its impact continues through the Woods Scholarship, which has supported over 34 students since its establishment in 2015.

This year, the Ronald J. Woods Charitable Trust Annual Scholarship will award four \$5,000 scholarships to first-time, full-time teacher education students who are Montana high school graduates. This scholarship upholds Mr. Woods's vision

of empowering hardworking students dedicated to education and creating a better future.

UMW Announces Free On-Campus Housing for Graduating Seniors in Beaverhead County

Montana Western is excited to announce the Beaverhead Bulldog Bundle, a special offer for high school seniors graduating in Spring 2025 who are residents of Beaverhead County. The bundle provides free on-campus housing for these students who choose to attend Montana Western, helping local students save significantly as they begin their college journey.

Graduates eligible for the Beaverhead Bulldog Bundle will receive complimentary accommodations in either JDC, a savings of \$3,424, or Mathews Hall, a savings of \$3,506, for their freshman year. All Beaverhead County students graduating in Spring 2025 are eligible, including homeschooled students.

UMW Hosts Community Water Conversations Panel with Trout Unlimited

Bulldogs Football Win First Playoff Game Since 1994

After a 30-year playoff win drought, the no. 4 ranked Montana Western football team picked up their first NAIA Football Championship Series (FCS) win in Bulldog Stadium with a 41-14 rout of the no. 14-seeded Dickinson State Blue Hawks. The Bulldogs were led by Michael Palandri, who threw for 388 passing yards and five touchdowns.

Iola "Olie" Else Receives MFBF Distinguished Service Award

lola "Olie" Else, a long-time member of the University of Montana Western community, received the prestigious Montana Farm Bureau Distinguished Service Award on November 19 during a luncheon at the Montana Farm Bureau Annual Convention in Billings.

Else, who served as UMW's Rodeo Coach and Faculty Advisor for over three decades, was named the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Coach of the Year in 2004 and 2018. She continues to serve as the faculty advisor for UMW's Young Farmers and Ranchers club.

In her acceptance speech, Else emphasized the importance of engaging the next generation in agriculture. "We need to attract and retain young people in agriculture," she said. "Montana Farm Bureau's Young Farmers and Ranchers Program plays a vital role in keeping young people connected to agriculture. Despite the challenges, many of my students have returned to contribute significantly to their family farms and ranches."

UMW Hosts Business Idea Pitch Competition

The University of Montana Western's Business Department hosted a campuswide Business Idea Pitch Competition on Thursday, December 5, in the Small Auditorium. Students from various disciplines competed, presenting their innovative business ideas in a "Shark Tank"-style competition.
