Dear Members of the Board of Regents,

It is my honor to present the attached Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters nomination packet for UM alumnus Lana Batts. This nomination has been through the campus process, including action by the appropriate department/college level. The Faculty Senate at the University of Montana will review this nomination during the executive session of their September meeting.

The former President of the Truckload Carriers Association and Senior Vice President of Government Affairs at the American Trucking Association, Lana Batts is described as "a standout figure in the transportation sector." During her decades in the trucking industry, Batts is credited with revitalizing the Professional Truck Driver Institute and creating the Truckload Academy while also being a leading policy advocate and a trailblazer for women in the transportation sector. Batts' impact on the trucking industry also includes service on numerous corporate boards, co-founding Driver iQ, a full-service background screening company for the trucking industry, and serving as a managing partner at Transport Capital Partners, an investment firm specializing in mergers and acquisitions of trucking companies. She has received numerous awards for her transformative career, including the Lee Crittenden Memorial Award and the Truckload Carriers Associations' Past Chairmen's Award.

A native of Billings, Montana, Lana Batts graduated from the University of Montana in 1968 with a Bachelor's in History and Political Science. While at UM, Batts honed her communication skills on the UM debate team, and her athletic skills on the UM luge team. Batts even qualified for the USA Olympics luge team but was unfortunately not able to compete due to an injury. Batts further education includes a 1978 Master's degree in Politics and Public Affairs from the University of Miami.

Beyond her professional accomplishments, Batts is also a dedicated member of the Glacier National Park Conservancy Board of Directors, the Flathead Lake Biological Station Advisory Board, and supporter of the Montana Museum of Art and Culture, Montana Audubon, and the Missoula Butterfly Museum. The attached nomination packet highlights the magnitude of Lana Batts' community service work.

For her many professional accomplishments and impressive work in community service, Lana Batts has my full support as an exceptional candidate for an honorary doctorate from the University of Montana. Thank you for your consideration.

RE: Letter of Support for Lana Richards Batts – Honorary Doctorate Nomination

Dear President Bodnar,

It is with great admiration and enthusiasm that I write in support of awarding an honorary doctorate from the University of Montana to Lana Richards Batts, a distinguished alumna whose pioneering contributions to American industry, commitment to public service, and deep-rooted support of education and conservation make her a remarkably qualified candidate for this honor.

Born and raised in Billings, Lana's Montana roots shaped both her grit and determination. She earned her B.A. in History and Political Science at the University of Montana, where she excelled not only in the classroom but also as a member of the university debate team—a formative experience that helped sharpen the persuasive communication skills she would later bring to the national stage. She went on to receive a master's degree in Politics and Public Affairs from the University of Miami, further deepening her knowledge of public policy and setting the stage for her future leadership in national transportation policy and advocacy.

One of the lesser-known parts of Lana's story reflects the adventurous spirit and boldness she brought to many aspects of her life: from 1965 to 1968, she was a member of the University of Montana luge team. Lana qualified for the USA Olympic luge squad, but an injury in 1968 brought that chapter to a close. Though short-lived, her time in the sport remains a memorable part of her journey, reflecting the determination and willingness to take on challenges that have marked her career.

Lana began her career in 1973 at the American Trucking Associations (ATA) as a transportation analyst—the highest-paid woman but the lowest-paid professional. Undeterred, she steadily rose through the ranks, ultimately becoming Senior Vice President of Government Affairs at ATA, and later, President of the Truckload Carriers Association (TCA). She co-founded Driver iQ, served on the boards of numerous transportation companies including Brown Trucking, SeaBridge International, and Mullen Transportation, Inc., and helped shape key industry standards—revamping the Professional Truck Driver Institute, creating the Truckload Academy, and advocating early for the Commercial Driver's License.

Throughout her career, Lana remained a passionate advocate for women in trucking, often reflecting on how, despite growing up in a trucking family, it never occurred to her that she could run her father's company—because women were only seen in back-office roles. Her leadership has helped change that narrative for countless others.

Lana's commitment to conservation and education has been both long-standing and deeply impactful. Together with her husband Joe, she has been a generous benefactor to numerous Montana institutions. She currently serves on the boards of the Glacier National Park Conservancy and the Flathead Lake Biological Station Advisory Board. Their philanthropic support includes major contributions to the Montana Museum of Art and Culture, where a gallery bears their name, and to the Missoula Butterfly House & Insectarium. At the University of Montana, they have provided consistent and often unrestricted support, allowing for maximum impact across a wide range of departments and programs—including History, Political Science, Communication Studies, and the Bird Ecology Lab.

Her long list of accolades includes trucking's S. Earl Dove Award, the Woman of the Year Award from the Women's Transportation Seminar, and the University of Montana's Distinguished Alumni Award in 2019. Most recently, she and Joe were honored with the Lifetime Achievement Award from Montana Audubon at the 2025 *Wings Across the Big Sky* festival.

Lana has never been afraid to take the fast, uncertain track—whether on ice, in boardrooms, or in federal policymaking circles. Her legacy is one of leadership, resilience, and generous service to her community, her industry, and her alma mater. Her life reflects the best of what the University of Montana aims to instill in its students: courage, intellect, and a commitment to making the world better.

It is without reservation that I urge you to bestow this well-deserved honor upon Lana Richards Batts.

It gives me great pleasure to support the university's acknowledgement of Lana Richards Batts. Lana strikes me as not only among the most loyal alumnae of the university, but also the finest representative of a lifelong learner who never ceased to explore and grow beyond her original years at UM. Moreover, Lana has proven to be the most dedicated supporter of critical inquiry, stepping up where there is a challenge and an opportunity. She is among the most curious and dedicated individuals I have ever met.

Lana's relationship with the Montana Museum of Art and Culture began when she and her husband Joe visited the exhibition "Avis marvelous: Ornithology in 19th Century Art and Science" in fall 2021. The exhibition was a first because it was co-curated between our museum staff and UM's Philip L. Wright Zoological Museum. It presented the ways artists and scientists analyzed, documented, and celebrated avian life in the 19th century through art, publications, and other printed works. It also recreated museum displays with specimens from the Wright meant to educate and enlighten the public about bird life in the Americas.

Avid birders themselves, Lana and Joe were taken with the vision of the show. Lana, in particular, wanted to know more, not just about the exhibition's content and communication strategies, but also about the museum's novel partnership with students and faculty in the biological sciences.
