Justin "Mr. Fascinate" Shaifer

Linkedin Top Voice in Technology, Science TV Show Host & STEM Educator

A rising star in STEM education and advocacy, Justin Shaifer is a LinkedIn Top Voice in Technology and popular science communicator with a talent for understanding and inspiring Gen Z. He is the Cofounder of the STEM Success Summit.

Growing up in a single-parent home on the south side of Chicago, Justin Shaifer spent his days goofing off, acting up, and excelling as the class clown. Although secretly fascinated with science, he never had the opportunity to express that excitement — it just wasn't cool. That was until his mom made him sign a contract at 14 years old promising he would figure out a way to

pay for college.

While searching for scholarships, Shaifer quickly realized there were pools of money around STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) Education. And he made good on that contract. Shaifer earned scholarships from NASA and NOAA that covered 100% of his tuition and room and board at Hampton University. He graduated with a degree in marine and environmental science, earning the department's highest GPA while also serving as student body president.

Today, Shaifer is so much more than cool. An entrepreneur, speaker, top voice in technology and STEM advocate, he travels the country as the role model he never had, making STEM dope, he says. Inspired to pay his success forward, Shaifer co-founded the STEM Success Summit, a large-scale conference for diverse STEM students that secured sponsorships from Best Buy and General Motors. He also co-founded Beyond: A gamified platform that helps diverse students learn tech skills while earning prizes from their favorite brands. Shaifer has hosted science TV shows with WGBH, the Travel Channel and Al Roker Entertainment.

Known as "Mr. Fascinate," Shaifer has made it his life's work to bring his passion for STEM disciplines to the next generation, especially kids who are typically underrepresented in elite science-based careers. From his viral TEDx talk, "How to Speak Generation Z," to his body of curriculum development work, Shaifer is a leading figure in STEM education and diversity. His energy never fails to get audiences interested in hearing what he has to say.

Crash Course in College Readiness

Dr. Tricia Seifert is a professor in the Adult & Higher Education program at Montana State University. She also maintains a faculty appointment at the University of Toronto. Her research broadly investigates the relationship between college student experiences and postsecondary learning and success. Troubled by the number of students who withdraw from post-secondary education after their first year, Dr. Seifert has begun examining how to support students in the college transition. She currently is creating a suite of games to develop students' navigational knowledge of the postsecondary landscape and has launched Success Prints Crash Course for commercial purchase by households, high schools, and higher education institutions. She

recently co-authored How College Affects Students, vol. 3, published by Wiley and served a five-year term as Associate Editor for International Research & Scholarship for the Journal of College Student Development.

Learning Leaps and Accelerated Skills Recovery

For more than 20 years, Charlotte Rainey Parham has been an educator in the Arkansas community. Dr. Parham served as an elementary teacher, gifted specialist, principal, and district administrator. She is a national consultant and author who currently serves as an Assistant Professor of Leadership Studies at the University of Central Arkansas. Her research focuses are systems of equity, parental involvement, academic achievement gaps, school readiness, and disruptive innovation.

Dr. Green is the executive director for Arkansas Imagination Library, the state's affiliate for the Dolly Parton Imagination Library book gifting program. She

is also the founder and CEO of Strategic Inc., a consulting firm that partners with schools and various organizations to support areas of equity and literacy.

Do you need to re-establish teacher agency - the connection between instruction and student impact? Do your schools need help with learning leaps and accelerated student learning?

A mix of historical practices and the difficulties of educating students during a pandemic poses a brand-new challenge for students and their teachers as no one is quite sure what students have learned and what they do not know. This 90-minute presentation will:

- 1. Illustrate how to accelerate students who may have been promoted to the next grade without a mastery of prior grade-level skills,
- 2. Give a 45-minute Academic Skills Recovery Assessment to decide how to meet your students at their current proficiency level in math, English, reading and/or science,
- 3. Restore teacher confidence that what they do in the classroom has a direct impact on their students' learning,
- 4. Show the best way to springboard your students to success with a focused, targeted review of the most needed core skills,
- 5. Provide a blueprint for increasing classroom engagement by focusing on mastering a subset of High School and Middle School college and career readiness skills,
- 6. Highlight a system of multi-year benchmarks to measure progress, and
- 7.Define what you want your students to learn and how you are going to celebrate their achievements.

Option 1: Mission Impossible: Planning a Successful Summer Experience During a Global Pandemic

Summary: Your mission, if you choose to accept it, is to plan a summer camp that students will actually want to attend and inspires them to overcome all obstacles, even a global pandemic. In this session, we will explore how to plan, prepare, market and execute a face-to-face summer camp (with virtual contingencies) that can bring your students together and provide an unforgettable and transformative experience. In this fun, interactive workshop, participants will discover techniques and activities that they can use to promote resilience and educational success. The pace of these types of campus visits can be overwhelming and may very well lead to early-onset imposter syndrome. A sense of belonging is what so many first-generation college students will need in order to persist and overcome all the institutional hurdles that await them. We asked ourselves, "What if, rather than visit as many colleges as possible, our GEAR UP students experienced regular, weekly programming at our local University? How might this impact their sense of belonging on a college campus and their desire to pursue higher education as a result?" Come learn how we partnered with our local University's mentoring program to provide engaging on-campus and academic support services on a weekly basis.

Option 3: Mission to Mars LEGO Robotics Summer Camp

Students had the opportunity to engage in several hands-on activities involving coding and programming of EV3 LEGO robots, flying drones, searching for life using a digital microscope and a gas detector, building straw rockets and helicopters, and creating Ozobot stories. Jaycee Atkins is the GEAR UP Coordinator for Bonners Ferry School District in Bonners Ferry, Idaho. Though she works in a small and isolated community, Jaycee leaves no stone unturned when it comes to seeking out resources and opportunities for her students. Jaycee attacks every challenge with a contagious enthusiasm that is evident in the way she inspires and engages her school community.

Deahl, Jacque

Jacque Deahl has been the GEAR UP Idaho State Project Director for just over 5 years. Prior to her time with GEAR UP, Jacque ran a college readiness initiative for two community colleges and worked in program management, marketing, and development for multiple youth-focused nonprofits including: CASA, Boys and Girls Clubs, and Junior Achievement. Working to raise funding and support for critical services in her community, Jacque came to appreciate the power of data, storytelling, and collaboration as instruments for cultivating buy-in from stakeholders. Though she uses them often, Jacque has failed to master the art of the common idiom and will mess one up in almost any conversation, but that's the way the cookie stumbles.

Dr. Hernandez, Jose

Jose Hernandez is a Lead Data Scientist on the WeBe project. He earned his Ph.D. in Measurement and Statistics and Masters in Education Policy from the University of Washington. His doctoral research assessed the causal inference methodology in the absence of randomization on complex data structures. He works as a Senior Data Scientist at the University of Washington's eScience Institute and a Data Science Senior Fellow at the Center for Education in Seattle. He also serves at the College and Career Leadership Institute as a facilitator. As a first-generation college graduate raised in a Mexican immigrant community, Jose intimately understands how race, ethnicity, gender, and income remain barriers to mentoring a sense of belonging.

<u>Galati, Bridget</u>

Bridget Galati has over 10 years of experience in secondary education, first as a middle school teacher in Camden, New Jersey, and later as an English Learner specialist in Denver. As a first-gen college student herself, she is passionate about access to higher education for all students.

<u>Gregg, Duane</u>

Duane is the Project Director for GEAR UP Tennessee at the Tennessee Higher Education Commission (THEC), where he has worked for the past 9 years. Duane spent 6 years as the East Tennessee Regional Coordinator for GEAR UP TN prior to assuming the position as the Director. Prior to joining THEC, Duane worked for 12 years in business and over 6 years in education and college access. His experiences include serving as an Upward Bound Director, Educational Talent Search Coordinator, academic advisor, college instructor, and juvenile justice counselor. He served in the U.S. Army for 17 years, including 6 years as an instructor with the U.S. Army Reserve. Duane holds a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Florida, a Master of Public Administration from the University of Tennessee, and a Doctorate in Higher Education Administration from the University of Memphis. His doctoral dissertation focused on the student retention practices of community colleges in Tennessee, and Duane's focus in higher education, Duane and his wife Nancy spend their time traveling, participating in local and foreign mission trips, attending UT football games, and supporting music events and theatre.

<u>Gunder, Danielle</u>

Danielle Gunder is a Senior Program Manager at Get Schooled directing programs and campaigns to support young people getting to, and succeeding in, college. Prior to Get Schooled Danielle was a high school teacher in Phoenix where she also served as the college advisor. For 6 years she worked at University of Washington School of Medicine as the first Education Specialist for the newly created Office of Rural Programs. In this role, Danielle established clinical teaching sites across 5 states to create highly trained doctors for rural America. Danielle is an AmeriCorps Alumni and first generation college student. She earned her Master of Secondary Education from Arizona State University and two BA's in Biology and Psychology from Gonzaga University.

<u>Guzman, Alma</u>

Site Manager at Chief Moses Middle School located in Moses Lake, WA. She started working with GEAR UP in January 2021 but has prior experience serving students in non-profit organizations to reach their academic and career goals. As a student advocate, she is very passionate about providing students with opportunities to grow in their future academics and careers.

<u>Wilson, Karen</u>




